

Thomcord Grape

Vitis vinifera cross

Two of America's favorite grapes—Concord, of peanut-butter-and-jelly-sandwich fame, and Thompson Seedless, a summertime classic—are proud parents of a tasty seedless grape called Thomcord.

The plump, juicy Thomcord was developed by the USDA-ARS.

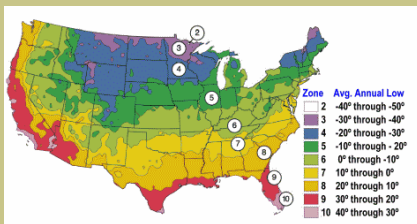
Blue-black skin, whitish bloom and bold flesh color of the Concord, plus a pleasing Concord-like flavor that's lightened by the sweet, mild taste of its Thompson parent. The fruit is slightly firmer than Concord.

Ripens in late July through mid-August.

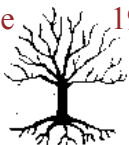
Cold hardy to U.S.D.A. Zone 7 and probably 6.
